Join us on Wednesday, Feb. 19 for dinner and an informative UCLA Conversation with **William Ouchi**, who is Sanford and Betty Sigoloff Distinguished Professor, Emeritus, at UCLA's Anderson School of Management; author of the 2003 book, "Making Schools Work: A Revolutionary

Plan to Get Your Children the Education They Need," based on a comprehensive study he led of 223 schools in six cities across North America funded partly by the National Science Foundation; author of the 1981 New York Times bestseller "Theory Z: How American Management Can Meet the Japanese Challenge," which has been published in 16 foreign editions and ranks as the seventh most widely held book of the 12 million titles held in more than 4,000 U.S. libraries; and author of the 2009 book, "The Secret of TSL," which reports on a study he led of 442 schools in eight decentralizing urban districts. Professor Ouchi served as Co-Founder, with former Los Angeles Mayor Richard Riordan, of The Riordan Programs at the Anderson School; Co-Founder and Chairman of LEARN (Los Angeles Education Partnership for Restructuring Now); member of the founding board of directors of The Japanese American National Museum, Los Angeles; and a consultant to, among others, the New York City School District, State of Hawaii School District and Los Angeles Unified School District. Professor Ouchi, who conducts research on the structure of large organizations, says school systems are not very different from large businesses with multiple subunits. This conversation will be led by **Daniel J.B. Mitchell**, Professor Emeritus at UCLA's Anderson Graduate School of Management and UCLA's Luskin School of Public Affairs, who has served on the Emeriti Association's Board of Directors for more than a decade. Our reception starts at 4:45 p.m., dinner starts at 6 p.m., followed by our program. The evening will conclude by 8:30 p.m.

The Emeriti and Retirees Associations invite you to a free, delightful musical program on Tuesday, Jan. 14, from 1:30-3 p.m., featuring piano recitals by two extremely talented students in The UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music. Performing will be:

• Grace Chen is a UCLA senior piano major studying under Inna Faliks, a renowned concert pianist and Professor and Head of the School's Piano Department. Professor Faliks describes Grace as "a keenly intelligent young artist with true depth and honesty." Grace is also a computer science major, an accomplished painter, and a recipient of the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music's Falk Scholarship. Her other awards include first place Rubinyi Scholarship Competition in 2023, Northern Regional Winner of the 2021 MTAC Piano Concerto Competition and finalist in the 2020 Marilyn Mindell Piano Competition. Grace started learning piano at age six over Skype with her grandmother, a graduate of the Shanghai Conservatory of Music and piano professor at Shanghai Jiao Tong University.

• Terry Hsu, a UCLA senior studying under the guidance of Professor David Kaplan, is a native of Taiwan, who embarked on his musical journey independently at age 14. At UCLA, he is both a distinguished Gluck Fellow and a recipient of the Emil Danenberg and Beatrice Zelkin Scholarships. At last year's Brevard Music Festival, his exceptional talent earned

Terry a prize in the Brevard Piano Competition. Professor Kaplan holds UCLA's Shapiro Chair in Piano Performance. Hsu has taken masterclasses with Professor Faliks, who praised his impressive skills.

Both Grace and Terry will perform piano concerts on the Faculty Club's Steinway B piano, located in the Morrison Room, and each will have a short conversation with Stuart Wolpert, director of UCLA Conversations.

The program will include music composed by Bach, Chopin, Rachmaninoff, Brahms and more.

Professor Faliks is the author of the musical memoir, "Weight in the Fingertips: A Musical Odyssey from Soviet Ukraine to the World Stage." Her memoir details her exploration of Bach's brilliant music as she grew up in Odessa and became a child prodigy, with the piano her best friend, and her steady rise as a world-renowned concert pianist.

Be sure to fill out your UC Survey of Emeriti Activity

The UC Survey of Emeriti Activity, conducted every three years, is taking place now. The survey documents the many activities and contributions of UC emeriti. When you receive your survey, please fill it out. It won't take long. The survey has been sent to more than 1,700 UCLA emeriti. The nine other UC campuses are also conducting the emeriti survey this fall. The contributions of emeriti to UC's mission are so significant that when the combined emeriti activities from all 10 campuses are converted into monetary value, the effort could support an 11th campus, in terms of research grants and publications, teaching, and community and university service — and at no cost, said Emeriti Survey Chair Seymour Levin, UCLA professor emeritus of medicine. For example, the previous emeriti survey, covering the fiscal years of 2019-2021, showed that during these three years, research awards for UCLA emeriti principal investigators totaled more than \$159 million.

Survey results are shared with UCLA and UC administrators, as well as those at other UC campuses.

Among the survey's questions: Have you authored or co-authored any published articles, book chapters or papers in your field/profession during 2021-2024? Have you authored or co-authored any published books in your field/profession during 2021-2024? Please indicate whether you received funding for your research or creative work during 2021-2024. Have you received any honors or other recognition during 2021-2024?

Levin said he hopes that members of the Academic Senate at UCLA-affiliated medical centers will be included among the recipients of the survey.

The survey is conducted under the auspices of the Council of University of California Emeriti Associations (CUCEA).

Profs. Jens Palsberg, Jacob Foster spoke with us about the Promise, Peril and Implications of Artificial Intelligence at our fall dinner program, honoring outstanding emeriti

In addition to honoring outstanding emeriti (see front-page President's Message), our fall dinner included a lively conversation on "The Promise, Peril and Implications of Artificial Intelligence." Jens Palsberg, UCLA Professor and former Department Chair of Computer Science, and director of the UCLA-Amazon Science Hub for Humanity and Artificial Intelligence, and Jacob Professor Foster. а of Sociology and computational social scientist who served on UCLA's faculty from 2013 until this year, when he accepted a position as Professor of Informatics and Cognitive Science at Indiana University, discussed with Stuart Wolpert, director of UCLA Conversations, their insights on how A.I. may impact health care, education, society, among other topics. This program was not recorded.

This "Implications program of Artificial on Intelligence" featured Christopher Kelty, a UCLA professor in the Institute for Society and Genetics and the departments of information studies and anthropology, and director of the Livescu Initiative on Neuro, Narrative and AI, and Daniel Snelson, a UCLA assistant professor of English and design and a writer, editor and archivist, who teaches an English course on AI literature. They discussed with Stuart Wolpert, director of UCLA Conversations, topics including how A.I. may impact creativity, art, culture, education, jobs, health and more. Among the questions they addressed: Should we be excited about artificial intelligence, or terrified, or both?

Esther Grassian awarded with the US Information Literacy Award

The Universal Information Literacies Association (UiLA) has announced Esther Grassian, UCLA Distinguished Librarian Emerita and Lecturer, is the 2024 winner of the US Information Literacy Individual Paul G. Zurkowski, Esq. Award. This prestigious award honors community leaders, a U.S. state or community, and a country or international community for their outstanding contributions to promoting evidence-based, experience-driven, and reasoned information literacy and critical thinking in public service.



Grassian's distinguished career as an information literacy advocate and educator has earned her widespread recognition. A pioneer in her field, she co-authored Information Literacy Instruction: Theory and Practice in 2001, a

foundational text in information literacy education. Grassian continues to shape best practices through the LILi Project, which develops innovative models for lifelong information literacy instruction.

In Memoriam

A.R. Frank Wazzan, 88, renowned nuclear thermal-hydraulics engineer and former dean of UCLA Samueli.

A.R. Frank Wazzan, a distinguished professor emeritus of the UCLA Samueli School of Engineering who served as the school's dean for 15

years, died Oct. 1 from natural causes. He was 88.

Wazzan was an internationally recognized researcher in nuclear material, thermal hydraulics and stability of laminar flows. He worked on the design of underwater weapon systems for the U.S. Navy and pressurized underwater nuclear reactors for commercial applications. He studied nuclear radiation's effect on electronic materials and communication satellites, and conducted theoretical experiments to strengthen rocket boosters and satellites against laser and microwave weapon attacks. Wazzan was also an in-demand consultant for, among others, the Department of Defense through the RAND Corporation, the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, the French Atomic Energy Commission and electric utilities in France.

Upon receiving his doctorate from UC Berkeley in 1963, Wazzan joined the then-UCLA College of Engineering the same year as an assistant professor. He taught a broad range of courses, including thermodynamics, propulsion and material properties. Over the next nearly four decades, he built a successful career in the school of engineering, becoming an assistant dean in 1978, associate dean in 1981, acting dean in 1986 and as the school's sixth permanent dean in 1987 — a position he held until 2001.

Under Wazzan's leadership, a graduate program in biomedical engineering was established, and he oversaw successful faculty recruitment efforts, particularly in emerging areas at the time, such as micro-electromechanical systems. He was also instrumental in the construction of the Engineering IV building and helped set in motion the designs for the Engineering V building, which now stands where Engineering I used to be.

An educator, critic, preservationist and historian, Rosen was instrumental in growing the UCLA Film & Television Archive into the world's largest university-based repository of original film and television materials, a legacy he built over 30 vears. As founding director, his vision and dedication ensured that generations of scholars, filmmakers, colleagues and audiences had access to these invaluable resources. In 1999, Rosen was appointed dean of TFT, a role he would serve for a decade. He established the UCLA School of Theater, Film and Television Online Program, creating global access to world-class education opportunities. Rosen delivered scholarly talks about film criticism, media history and film curation and was widely published.

Rosen held numerous leadership positions, including as founding director of the National Center for Film and Video Preservation at the American Film Institute.
