#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In my rather longish letter that accompanied the membership solicitation and renewal form, I introduced the leadership of the Emeriti Association and outlined some of the initiatives that we wished to pursue. Some of those efforts are described by their leaders in this Newsletter. At that time we discussed the survey that we planned. I am happy to tell you all that response to both the survey and the membership solicitation has been quite good, with at least the early returns running well ahead of what we anticipated and had hoped for. After the analysis, this will help us shape the organization and align it more closely with the wishes of the membership.

We did not sneak a peek at the survev results, but we hope that it has a reasonable number of volunteers for various important emeriti functions as well as new initiatives. One of the most difficult tasks of the EA leadership is filling the various positions needed to keep the organization functioning. There are various good reasons why people may not be interested and willing to volunteer, but one impression that is untrue and that we need to counter is the perception that the organization is an elitist "in-group" that does not welcome newcomers not previously associated with us.

We welcome you, we want you and we need you. We need your new ideas, your new energy and, yes, even your willingness to do sometimes quite pedestrian and rote tasks. One of my most interesting activities of the group has been stuffing parties. We stuff envelopes, but it is the quality of conversation and the interesting people whom you meet that makes it so worthwhile. It also gives you the opportunity to strut your "stuff".

There is a cliché about people that trouble finds. The last several weeks have posed just some situations for the Emeriti Association. The University has undertaken a reimagining of the healthcare insurance program that affects employees and retirees in a major way. Our initial analysis, based on incomplete information, suggests that those whose care is obtained at UCLA or a UCLA-affiliated facility will be little affected, save for the fact that the Anthem Plus plan will no longer exist or have an equivalent. The effect on those living outside of the UCLA orbit, and particularly outside of California, face a less certain and a less easily understood set of options. In either case the level of uncertainty is high. The leadership understands that we must take responsibility for addressing these issues and we will do so in a number of ways. We will get the best information and interpretations available. We will share this information through email

blasts to our members (another reason for joining the Association) and on our Facebook page we will try to raise awareness of on-campus sessions to allow for questions and answers. We will do whatever we can to make the process easier.

Again, I welcome you all to the new academic year, a calendar device that affects some of us and not others. Join us in making our organization as vibrant, exciting and useful as possible and help make all of our lives richer.

# FALL DINNER PROGRAM; "BLUE SKIES IN CHINA"

At the Fall Dinner on Wednesday, November 20, UCLA Professor **Matthew E. Kahn** will discuss the outlook for "Blue Skies in China".

Over the next few decades, over one billion people are likely to move to Asia's cities. Such individuals seek new opportunities to improve their standard of living. What are the likely local and global environmental implications of this urban growth? Professor Kahn's talk will focus on the environmental consequences of urban growth in China. How optimistic can we be that incentives will be introduced to achieve the "win-win" of economic growth and blue skies? What role will technological advance play in decoupling pollution

production from economic activity?

Matthew E. Kahn is a Professor at the UCLA Institute of the Environment, the Department of Economics, the Department of Public Policy, the Anderson School of Management, and the UCLA Law School. He is a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research and a research fellow at Institut zur Zukunft der Arbeit (IZA). He has authored several books, the most recent being *Fundamentals of Environmental Economics: Solving Urban Pollution Problems* (July, 2013).

Thursday, December 12, 2013: "Reel Justice 4: The Courtroom Returns to the Movies", by Paul Bergman.

Law-related films and TV shows greatly influence popular beliefs about law, lawyers and the legal system. In this fourth in a highly successful series of presentations to the UCLA Emeriti Association, UCLA Professor of Law Emeritus Paul Bergman will show and discuss entertaining clips from both well-known and not-so-well-known films. He will compare pop culture to reality and provide interesting insights into the history of film and law.

Paul Bergman has been honored with three awards for distinguished teaching from UCLA and from the American Trial Lawyers Association. He is the author of fourteen books and about 35 published articles and book chapters. He has also appeared in numerous presentations on TV and radio as well as to groups of attorneys and judges.

Professor Bergman will base this presentation on his book *Reel Justice: The Courtroom Goes to the Movies* (2d. Ed., 2006). The book is a paperback, and it is an entertaining read for anyone interested in law opr film. # NOMINATIONS INVITED FOR EMERITI AWARDS

Nominations are now open for the 2014 Constantine Panunzio Distinguished Emeritus Award and the Edward A. Dickson Emeritus Professorship Awards. These awards recognize and honor University of California emeritus faculty for outstanding scholarly, educational, and/or other professional accomplishments since their retirement

#### Constantine Panunzio Award.

The Panunzio Award was made possible by a bequest from its namesake, a UCLA Professor of Sociology who was instrumental in the development of UC's retirement system. Each UC campus may nominate one emeritus/a in a humanities or social sciences for this award, which consists of a cash prize and a certificate. One or two statewide awards are made annually. The awardees in 2013 were Frederick Burwick (English) from UCLA and Michael Nauenberg (Physics) from UC Santa Cruz the latter for his seventeen years of post-retirement work in the history of science.

At UCLA, Deans in the humanities and social sciences, as well as the Emeriti Association's Awards Committee, are asked to solicit nominations by the end of October. Individual emeriti may also self-Nomination materials nominate. consist mainly of a curriculum vitae and a cover letter. UCLA candidates are evaluated by the Emeriti Association's Awards Committee and reviewed by the Deans of the humanities and social sciences. During January and February, the President of the Emeriti Association, working with the selected campus nominee, compiles a full dossier for the candidate and submit's the final campus nomination to the statewide selection award in mid-April.

The Awards Committee must receive nominations for the 2014 Panunzio Award by Friday, November 1, 2013. These should be sent to:

#### **Dickson Emeritus Professorships**

The Dickson Emeritus Professor**ships** were made possible by a gift from the late Edward A. Dickson, Regent of the University from 1913 to 1946. It honors outstanding research, scholarly work, teaching, and/or educational and professional service such as organizational, departmental or editorial posts or committees, performed by emeritus faculty of any discipline since retirement. Each UC campus has received funds that will support one or more awards each year. UCLA awardees in 2013 were Charlotte Neumann (School of Public Health), Vivian Sobchack (Theater Arts/ Division of Motion Pictures and Television), and Lawrence Kruger (Neurobiology).

Each UCLA department or school is limited to one nomination each vear. Emeriti Association members may nominate candidates also if they keep their related departments aware of their intentions. The supporting dossier should include a cover letter outlining the nominee's distinctive research, scholarly work, and/or other professional activity, a curriculum vitae, and supporting letters from two leaders in the field that comment specifically on the nominee's achievements since retiring.

> The digging was telling: this 33% contingent produced 176 books, over 2,000 articles, 327 book chapters, 636 abstracts, 165 professional reports, and 233 consulting reports besides mentoring 952 grad students and 633 undergrads, and serving on 344 doctoral committees, while whiling away recreational time writing 1,344 letters of recommendation.

Campus committee work also attracted many as crucial to the campus's governance, yet needing support since non-retired faculty tend to dodge or simply suffer slight slivers of it as ill-rewarded tedium.

With perspectives beyond such airs, a noble slice of these emeriti served variously on 182 department, 79 Academic Senate, 59 administration, 46 emeriti, 65 advisory, 37 fund raising, and 31 "other" committees, a commitment broadly echoed, meanwhile, by those in public service on 95 local, 28 state, and 92 national bodies, and those holding of offices in 47 such groups.

To a tally of whether they found themselves less, or more, or just as busy as they had been before retirement, nearly two-thirds of the respondents declared themselves just as, or busier.

Recompense for most of these activities was slight. Aside from the Nobel, grants for research, and modest funding for some lectures and teaching, the 121 professional honors and 95 community service honors reported were largely just that: honorary; inexpensive to confer, but (presumably) spiritual gold to receive.

Prior CUCEA surveys tastefully concluded on a high note of this sort. Given UC's funding challenges however, Adrian Harris, Vice Chancellor-Planning, Emeritus, UCLA, recommended that \$\$ factors should be included in this So much for hoping to RIP.

When money makes the world go

'round, the world carries UC with it. So a "Financial Data" category was added to the survey this time 'round.

First, as a monetary factor seldom mentioned, one should probably consider the value personified in the services of this survey's 320 very senior, prestigious respond-Given their full-and-parttime academic activities, the value of each to UC could be modestly averaged at \$100,000 a year which, applied to the 320 in the survey's triennium, would total \$96 million, \$32 million per year.

More tangibly, financial data reported by the survey's 320 respondents totaled \$124,669,320 in grant funding, plus \$56,890,520 in cash donations, and \$3,774,950 in cash-equivalent donations, for a grand total of \$185,334,790, nearly \$62 million per year.

Thus, if the survey's data are reasonably representative in valuing services rendered and funds annually contributed by just a onethird fraction of UCLA's emeriti, a conservative grand total for the monetary value of emeriti to UCLA's future runs close to a memorable \$100 million per year.

In short, with all of their activities most of these durable live wires are valuable assets who have at least avoided the fate of many in another historically lethal headline:
