To my fellow Emeriti, Retired Librarians, Partners and Friends:

Professors Palsberg and Foster will discuss with Stuart Wolpert, director of UCLA Conversations, topics including how A.I. may impact health care, education and society. At our fall dinner we will also honor the winners of the Panunzio, Dickson, and Goldberg awards, which recognize the outstanding work of Emeriti in research, teaching and mentoring, and ongoing service to the university and their professions.

Looking ahead to next year, 2025/26, EA Board positions open by appointment include—Hospitality Chair; Membership Chair.



Prof. Judith Baca to discuss her art with Rosina Becerra on Nov. 7 at 1:30 p.m.

Our second year of UCLA Conversations will begin on Thursday, Nov. 7 at 1:30 p.m. at the

Faculty Club. The Emeriti and Retirees Associations invite you to an important UCLA Conversation with Dr. Judith F. Baca, a UCLA Professor Emeritus and one of America's leading visual artists, who has been creating outstanding public art for four decades. Her powerful murals bring art to where people live and work. In 1974, Dr. Baca founded the City of Los Angeles' first mural program, which produced more than 400 employed thousands murals and of local and evolved participants, into an arts organization known as the Social and Public Art Resource Center (SPARC), which produces, preserves and promotes activist and socially relevant artwork, for which she serves as CEO and artistic director. Dr. Baca's public artworks focus on revealing and reconciling diverse peoples' struggles for their rights and reflect the lives and populations that have been concerns of historically disenfranchised, including women, the working poor, youth, the elderly and immigrant communities, throughout Los Angeles, nationally and internationally. Her works include the Great Wall of Los Angeles, located in San Fernando Valley — a mural that spans half a mile and is a work in progress, engaging another generation of youth. Her artwork gives voice to the voiceless and creates art of public memory that depicts the story of America. She was a senior professor in Chicana and Chicano and Central American studies and World Art and Cultures Departments from 1980 until 2018.

This conversation will be led by **Dr. Rosina Becerra**, professor emeritus of Social Work and Ethnomusicology, whose research focuses on policy

issues in health and mental health, particularly child welfare, and whose recent research documents the relationship between the social profession and ethnic communities. showing why and how ethnic minority agencies have played a pivotal role in their communities by filling the gaps left by mainstream social service agencies. She is the principal investigator for a State of California Department of Social Services five-year study of welfare reform in California. Dr. Becerra has held many senior positions, including UCLA's Vice Provost of Faculty Diversity and Development; Associate Vice Chancellor for Faculty Diversity; Director and Chair of the UCLA Cesar Chavez Center for Interdisciplinary Instruction in Chicano/a Studies; Dean of the UCLA School of Social Welfare. She served as past chair of the board at SPARC (Social and Public Art Resource Center) in Los Angeles.


Be sure to fill out your UC Survey of Emeriti Activity

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In Memoriam

Rev. James Lawson Jr., 95, civil and workers' rights icon and UCLA faculty member

The Rev. James Lawson Jr., one of the civil rights movement's most prominent leaders, a lifelong proponent and teacher of nonviolent activism, and a UCLA labor studies faculty member for nearly 25 years, died June 9 at age 95.

Referred to by his close friend the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. as "the mind of the movement" for civil rights and "the leading strategist of nonviolence in the world," Lawson was known internationally for teaching nonviolent resistance tactics to thousands of young activists.

After moving to Los Angeles in 1974 to become pastor of Holman United Methodist Church, transformed Lawson's the region's labor movement through his leadership and teaching, influencing a new generation of social justice activists and inspiring UCLA students, faculty and staff through his work with the university's Labor Center, Institute for Research on Labor and Employment, and labor studies academic program.

Lawson was awarded the UCLA Medal, the campus's highest honor, in 2018. In 2021, the UCLA Labor Center's historic MacArthur Park building was officially named the UCLA James Lawson Jr. Worker Justice Center in recognition of Lawson's decades-long commitment to the labor movement in Los Angeles.

Jeannie Oakes, 81, professor emerita and champion of educational equity and justice



Jeannie Oakes, UCLA's Presidential Professor Emerita of Education Equity, was the embodiment of philosopher John Dewey's belief that education should be about the fullness of human capacity, not just improving economic prospects. After a life and career that informed and inspired many, she died at her home in Berkeley, California, on April 25 at age 81.

Oakes' scholarship and teaching set the direction for a UCLA School of Education & Information Studies dedicated to helping all students achieve their full potential and to developing educators committed to opportunity, equity and justice.

During her time at UCLA, Oakes founded <u>Center X</u>, which focuses on teacher education and educational leadership, and the <u>UCLA Institute for Democracy</u>, <u>Education</u>, and <u>Access</u>, which seeks to address racial and class inequalities in education. She also founded and directed the <u>University of California All Campus Consortium on Research for Diversity</u> and most recently served as director of education and scholarship at the Ford Foundation.

Daniel Atkinson, 102, pioneer in field of metabolic biochemistry

Daniel E. Atkinson, a professor of chemistry and biochemistry at UCLA for nearly 40 years who was recognized internationally for his seminal contributions to metabolic biochemistry, died Feb. 2 at age 102. Atkinson served as President of the Emeriti Association from 1997-1998.

He was the second biochemist appointed to what is now the UCLA Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, in 1952. He retired in 1991 but remained active in the UCLA community until moving to Oregon in 2011. He trained more than 30 doctoral students in his laboratory, and more than 20 postdoctoral fellows and visiting faculty.

Paul D. Sheats, 92, English professor

Paul D. Sheats, longtime professor of English at UCLA, died in Los Angeles on August 23, at the age of 92. He came to the Department of English in 1966, after receiving his Ph.D. from Harvard University, having previously been a Rhodes scholar in Oxford. At the time of his arrival, his father, Paul H. Sheats, was Dean of University Extension at UCLA. Sheats specialized in English Romantic poetry, particularly the works of Keats and Wordsworth, and he published fresh editions

of their poems. His major scholarly contribution was his book from Harvard University Press on Wordsworth's early work, The Making of Wordsworth's Poetry, 1785-1798. He was also much invested in that poet's great posthumous poem, The Prelude, especially its environmental concerns.

Sheats served as Chair of the English Department from 1978 to 1983, and, after his retirement, served as President of the Emeriti Association from 2009-2010.

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UCLA Emeriti Win Awards!

Dickson Emeritus Professorship Award

Funded from a gift endowment established by the late Edward A. Dickson, Regent of the University of California, this award honors outstanding research, scholarly work, teaching, and service performed by an Emeritus or Emerita Professor since retirement.

Four UCLA emeriti professors have been selected to receive the 2023–2024 Edward A. Dickson Emeritus Professorship Award, which includes a prize of \$5,000:

Alan J. Ardell, Professor Emeritus of Material Sciences and Engineering, retired in 2006.

Thomas J. Coates, Distinguished Research Professor of Medicine, retired in 2018.

Robert Ettenger, Distinguished Research Professor in Pediatrics, retired in 2014.

Teofilo Ruiz, Distinguished Research Professor of History and Spanish and Portuguese retired in 2019.

Carole E. Goldberg Emeriti Service Award

Established in 2015, this award recognizes UCLA emeriti for exemplary service by an emeritus/emerita professor to the academic enterprise after retirement. The award honors outstanding service in professional, University, Academic Senate, emeriti, departmental or editorial posts, or committees.

Robert K. Oye, M.D., Professor Emeritus of Clinical Medicine, retired in 2021, has been selected to receive the 2023–2024 Carole E. Goldberg Emeriti Service Award, which includes a prize of \$1,000.

Constantine Panunzio Distinguished Emeriti Award

The late Dr. Panunzio, a Professor of Sociology at UCLA for many years, has been described as the architect of the UC Retirement System and was particularly active in improving pensions and stipends for his fellow Emeriti. This award bearing his name was established in 1983 and

includes a \$5,000 prize.

EMERITI AWARDS NOMINATIONS

The Constantine Panunzio Distinguished Emeriti Award, created by a bequest from Professor Panunzio of UCLA, honors outstanding scholarly work or educational service (e.g. service in professional, University, Academic Senate, emeriti, departmental or editorial posts, or committees) performed since retirement by a University of California emeritus or emerita in the Humanities or Social Sciences.

Each campus may submit **one nomination** to the Panunzio Award Selection Committee.

The **Edward A. Dickson Award** was created by a gift endowment from the late Edward A. Dickson, a Regent of the University of California from 1913 to 1946. The award honors outstanding research,

scholarly work, teaching, and/or educational service (e.g. service in professional, University, Academic Senate, emeriti, departmental editorial posts, or committees) performed by an emeritus or emerita professor since retirement. Each of the UC campuses has received funds that support one or more awards year. Nominations for this award should highlight the nominee's distinctive research, scholarly work, and/or educational service since retirement.

The Carole E. Goldberg Award was created in 2014 to honor outstanding service in professional, University, Academic Senate, emeriti, departmental or editorial posts, or committees performed at UCLA by an emeritus or emerita professor since retirement. Nominations for this award should highlight the nominee's distinguished service to UCLA since retirement.
